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Craft Corner

The Blind Man (all ages)

You will need: white paper plates, crayons, colored markers. Give each child a paper plate. Ask them to draw a face on one side with eye open, on the other side draw a face with eyes closed. Talk with the children about the story and discuss the feelings of the blind man before he met Jesus and after he met Jesus and was then able to see. Discuss how his life might change because he had met Jesus and ask the children if they felt they had changed in any way since they first knew of Jesus and the stories of Jesus.

Activity

'Blind' Games (all ages)

There are many traditional games such as Blind Man's Bluff, Pin the Tail On the Donkey, Cover the Eyes, Obstacle Course or Bear In the Honey Pot that could be played where children are blindfolded as part of the game.

With all these games, discuss the challenges that occur and explore with your kids the techniques they adopted to accomplish their goals. Discuss how other senses become more prominent.

Another topic of discussion could be how barriers are taken away for other-abled people to move around our communities such as recorded voices for crossing intersections, sidewalks with sloped curbs, etc.
