The Story: John 20:19-31

Context: There is not a lot to say contextually this week, since we're picking up this week right where we left off. Mary has returned and told the disciples about having seen the Lord. Now it is evening and the disciples are behind locked doors. As we close out the Gospel of John, keep an eye out for familiar themes and language (spoiler alert: the word "door" is the same as the word for "gate" in John 10 and John 18). Also, consider reading chapter 21 as well, as it has an important story in in it.



Reading the Story:

This is a story to read carefully and maybe more than once. Pay close attention to what's going on. Try to envision the scene as if it were a movie. How do things look? Who is where? How do the events actually happen? Try to put yourself there, almost like an invisible

Questions for Discussion & Reflection:

- What images, words, or phrases stood out to you in this passage?
- In what ways do we metaphorically hide behind a locked door in our faith?
- Why do you think the first thing Jesus says to them is "Peace be with you"?
- What is significant about Jesus breathing on them and saying "receive the Holy Spirit"? What does it say about who Jesus is? What does it say about the disciples after Jesus breathes on them?
- How does this scene compare and/contrast with the Pentecost scene in Acts 2?
- What does Jesus mean in verse 23?
- Where do you think Thomas was? Why wasn't he there? (note: there really are no clues in the text about this we can only speculate)
- Thomas shows up in the story a week later. What do you think the disciples were doing that week? And what has Jesus been doing?
- Is Thomas the only doubter? Why or why not?
- What do you think about Thomas' interaction with Jesus?
- •What does it mean to "believe"?
- •Verses 30-31 seem like a fitting end to the Gospel, so why doesn't John stop there?
