As we bring these prayers before you, may we remember that we all have...




Devotions for Life, Advent III The Story: Isaiah 42:1-9

Context: This week is our last week in the Hebrew Bible, and we close with probably the most well known Prophet, Isaiah. Isaiah is a long book, and most scholars actually think of it being 2 books (some even say 3), First Isaiah and Second Isaiah, or the latter "Deutero Isaiah". The two halves are so different in language, style, and content that some even think whoever actually penned Isaiah is two different people. This week's text is from Second Isaiah.

This text takes place towards the end of the Babylonian exile, probably sometime around 540 bce. This means that at this point Israel has been exile for as much as 50

years, which means many, if not most, Jews at this time were born into exile. How would a distressed exilic people hear these words? And how might a distressed exilic people inform what God has for them? As you read the passage today, keep that in mind, as well as Advent themes.

Advent at Home III:

[Light the candles you lit last week]

Questions for Reflection & Discussion:

- 1. Why do you think this story is prescribed for Advent in our lectionary?
- 2. The passage begins, "here is my servant..." Who is the servant? Many scholars outline 3 possibilities: King Cyrus of Persia, who ultimately calls the Jews back to Israel and restores them; The prophet himself; Or the Messiah, whomever he may be. Which of these do you think it is? Or is it someone else?
- 3. What does "justice to the nations" mean? What does it. mean in the text's context, and what does it mean in a more general sense?
- 4. What do you think verses 2 and 3 are about? What do they say in terms of <u>how</u> this "servant" will bring about "justice to the nations"?
- 5. As we think about Jesus as the Messiah, how might we understand verse 5?
- 6. What do you think "and the coastlands wait for his teaching" means? What coastlands? Is this literal or metaphorical? Both?
- 7. Why do you think God harkens back to the beginning of creation?
- 8. Why do you think the first thing God says about God's call to the people is "I have taken you by the hand"? Explore that image and what it might communicate.
- 9. What do you think the "former things" in verse 8 are? What are the "new things" to come?
- 10. After reflecting on all of this, ask again, "why is this an Advent text?"

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
